POLICE DEPARTMENT RENOVATIONS



In early 2016 the detective office received some major updating. An antiquated and unutilized juvenile holding cell was converted into much needed office space. Public works employees dismantled the steel lined cell block, added lighting, storage space and new flooring while detectives added a fresh coat of paint to their new office. The room expansion has created a more comfortable and modern work space for our investigators.



CHILD SAFETY SEAT PROGRAM


In 2016, Brookfield Police reinitiated their child safety seat program: The Brookfield Police Department is committed to the safety of our children. Nationally; child restraint misuse has been reported to be in excess of 83%. Children involved in motor vehicle collisions run a great risk of death or serious injury. A properly installed child safety seat can greatly reduce these factors. We now offer free child safety seat inspections by appointment. They are conducted by one of four Brookfield Police Officers who are nationally certified as child restraint system specialists. These technicians will educate and assist with the installation of child safety seats. They will also make certain:

- Your seat is installed correctly
- Your seat has not been recalled
- Your seat is correct for your child




NEW SCHEDULING SOFTWARE

In 2016 the Brookfield Police Department subscribed to a new online scheduling software called "PlanIt Police". It enables users to review and modify the schedule remotely from any computer, phone, or tablet. Some of the personnel management features include: calendar, time off banks, overtime, court appearances, and vehicle maintenance tracking. In the past we've documented and logged each of these categories by hand. This software has enabled us to have one working schedule that is immediately available for all employees.



Messaging is yet another progressive feature of this software. Upon logging into PlanIt Police, each employee is shown a list of announcements. Priority announcements will open automatically and can be configured to require a mandatory confirmation. All views and confirmations are logged and visible to administration. The software also tracks overtime which has helped to streamline some tedious administrative payroll tasks. The annual subscription fee for the department is \$1,555.00.






New Speed Monitor

Thanks to generous funding by Riverside Township in 2016, the Brookfield Police Department was able to purchase and install a new solar powered speed monitor on Washington Avenue in close proximity to Hollywood Elementary School, Riverside-Brookfield High School, and the Brookfield Zoo. The sign provides speed awareness in a school zone which is heavily populated with pedestrian traffic. These "your speed" signs are designed to slow traffic and ultimately make roadways safer.



Tactical Med Kits

In September 2016 Brookfield Officers were trained and equipped with emergency medical kits. The trauma medical kits are contained in nylon pouches worn by all of our patrol officers. Kits include a tourniquet, trauma bandage, face shield, rubber gloves, scissors and other emergency essentials. The Brookfield Citizen's Police Academy Alumni Association purchased these kits for every officer on the force.



2016 POLICE TRAINING REPORT

The Brookfield Police Department furthers its overall professionalism and increases the efficiency of service to the community by providing continuous training to all department personnel. The goal of department training is to provide employees with the necessary, basic, advanced and specialized needs in order to better prepare them for the performance of their duties in the field of law enforcement.

During the 2016 calendar year, Brookfield Police Department personnel received a broad selection of professional development training. This includes outsourced training, in-service and roll-call training, career development programs, firearms training and management-level programs.

Roll-call training provided department personnel with daily opportunities to learn and review up-to-date law enforcement information. Shift commanders and training officers led discussions which focused on topics such as: Death Investigation, Room Clearing Tactics, Traffic Stop Safety, Verbal and Tactical De-



Escalation, Use of Force, Vehicle Pursuit, legal updates and bulletins including the Brady Disclosure Rules, school safety discussions, evidence handling procedures and policy review. Internet and computer-based training related to search and seizure, and a variety of criminal law topics were completed on monthly basis.

Many other sources were used to provide training for department personnel. Some of those venues included the Northwestern Center for Public Safety, Illinois Public Employer Labor Relations Association (IPELRA), Northeast Multi-Regional Training (NEMRT), Intergovernmental Risk Management Agency (IRMA), Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB), FIAT SWAT, Tri-River Police Training, The Police Law Institute, FBI and the Police Training Institute (PTI) in Champaign-Urbana.

2016 TRAINING HIGHLIGHTS

LT. JAMES MIHALIK GRADUATES FROM NORTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY'S CENTER FOR PUBLIC SAFETY



The Brookfield Police Department is pleased to announce the graduation of **Lt. James Mihalik** from the School of Police Staff and Command (SPSC) at Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety. Lt. Mihalik successfully completed the ten (10) week Staff and Command Program held in Evanston, Illinois from March 14 – May 20, 2016. This program, which was implemented by the Center for Public Safety in 1983, has graduated over 10,000 students both nationally and internationally. Lt. Mihalik was a student in SPSC Class #396, which accommodated a total of 42 students for the ten-week period.

The School of Police Staff and Command provides upper-level college instruction in a total of twenty-two core or mandatory blocks of instruction and nine optional blocks of instruction during each session. The major topics of study include: Management and Management Theory, Organizational Behavior, Human Resources for Law Enforcement, Budgeting, Staffing Allocation, and Personnel Deployment.

The Center for Public Safety was established at Northwestern University in 1936 with the specific goal of expanding university-based education and training for the Law Enforcement Community. Since its inception, the Center has broadened its original objective and now provides a variety of courses and programs in the area of Police Training, Management Training, and Executive Development.

Detective Brian Jelinek successfully completed the 40-hour Lead Homicide Investigator training program.

Deputy Chief Ed Petrak, Lt. James Mihalik, Officer David Kudla and Officer Kevin Berry all completed the necessary coursework and requirements to become nationally certified Child Passenger Safety (CPS) technicians.




Officer Edward Weissgerber successfully completed the 40-Hour Field Training Officer course and now serves as a department FTO on the afternoon shift.

Both officers returned in December 2016 and completed a 40-hour Rifle Instructor training course. With this training, they now serve as the primary range instructors for the police department.

Brookfield Citizen's Police Academy



The Brookfield Police Department embraces a style of policing that involves a close working relationship with our community. Our department designed a ten-week police course for citizens and business leaders of Brookfield, called "Citizen's Police Academy." Our Citizen's Police Academy has three goals:


- Provide citizens with a better understanding and knowledge of how the Brookfield Police Department serves the community.
- Foster and strengthen community support and involvement.
- Create a safer community through the development of a partnership between the citizens of Brookfield and their police department.

Class participants learn about the use of K-9 officers, SWAT, rapid response training, computer crime, drug identification, DUI investigations, crime scene processing and interview/statement analysis. Citizens also have an opportunity to participate in simulated firearms training and a demonstration of the Taser X26 (electronic control weapon). Class members also tour the Brookfield Police Department and get to know our officers thru a ride-along experience. Fifteen community members graduated from our 2016 class.



Student Internship Program

All internships are non-paid, but do allow students to earn college credit while receiving real job experience and opening an avenue into the criminal justice system. The objective of this program is to furnish a meaningful learning experience and to provide an authentic observation of the police profession. In addition to an interactive learning experience with agency personnel, our interns are assigned projects, police academy tours, and ride-along experiences with the Brookfield Zoo Police and at least one other neighboring police department. This year's intern was **Carmine Romano** from Western Illinois University. We are proud to report that shortly after completing his internship and studies at WIU, Carmine was hired on as a full time police officer in Champaign, Illinois.



DALLAS POLICE SHOOTING



On July 7, 2016, twelve Dallas-Area Police Officers were shot, five fatally, during the deadliest incident for U.S. law enforcement since 9/11. In the week that followed the attack there were five funerals for these fallen officers over a horrific six-day period. Brookfield Officers Dan McCarthy and Chris Salava drove down to Dallas to lend support and attended the service for Dallas Police Sergeant Michael Smith.

We lost a beloved long-serving retired member of the department. Brookfield Police Officer, **Martin "Marty" Mitera** passed away September 5, 2016. Marty was a US Marine and a 30-year veteran of the police force. Marty was hired May 1, 1981 and retired May 1, 2011.

Marty was 63 years old.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORT STATISTICAL DATA

The below categories of crimes are reported to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program on a monthly basis. UCR is a city, county, and state law enforcement program which provides a nationwide view of crime based on the submission of statistics by law enforcement agencies throughout the country. The UCR Program's primary objective is to provide a reliable set of criminal justice statistics for law enforcement administration, operations and management, as well as to indicate fluctuations in the level of crime in America. Only eight (8) selected, serious crimes are included in the UCR report because they are the crimes most likely to occur with sufficient frequency to provide an adequate basis for comparison.



This graph represents trends in index crimes against person and property occurring in Brookfield over the last six years (2009-2016). The Blue colored bar is an indication of UCR Property Crime, Red bar represents Crimes against Person and Green is the combined/overall UCR crime indicator.

When we compare 2015 UCR data to 2016, the numbers indicate that index property crimes increased +26% (214 to 270) in 2016 while crimes against person decreased -46 % (28 to 15) over the same time period. Overall we had a +18 % (242 to 285) increase in UCR index crimes for 2016. Since the overall numbers in both major categories are relatively low, small fluctuations in any area can cause a significant increase or decrease when measured by percentage.

The Brookfield Police Department is a proponent of the motto "See Something –Say Something". We can work together to reduce crime by reporting suspicious activity, turning on lights and locking doors. These UCR property crime statistics include vehicle burglaries. In 2016 there were sixty-six (66) vehicle burglaries reported to the Brookfield Police Department. Of those 66 burglaries, 72% of victims reported that their doors had been left unlocked.



POLICE SERVICE ACTIVITY


In 2015 the Brookfield Police Department handled a total of **13,887** items for service. That number increased to **19,560** in 2016. Items for service include all dispatched incident calls, traffic stops, special watch and park checks, school walk-throughs, block party visits, vacation checks and some unfounded incident reports. This is more a grand total of all police dispatch activity including citizen calls and self-initiated officer activity. New police activity items are added and tracked each year. This explains the sharp increase in activity numbers between 2015 and 2016. As we become more efficient in the use and capabilities of Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD), we anticipate that these numbers will stabilize and become consistent from year to year.



Police Reports Generated

In 2015 the Brookfield Police Department handled a total of **7,374** items for service distribution. That number increased approximately 3% to **7,614** in 2016. Items for service distribution provide an accurate depiction of police reports generated during a calendar year. 



Brookfield Juvenile Division 2016

The Brookfield Police Department Juvenile Division has fourteen part time juvenile officers. The officers respond to and handle various calls and complaints. Juvenile officers have the power to handle youth cases through station adjustments or juvenile petitions. A station adjustment occurs when a juvenile offender is brought into the police station for criminal activity. Officers are able to use both formal and informal station adjustments. Informal station adjustments consist of a verbal warning without any record documentation. Formal station adjustments consist of a written contract between the juvenile and the police department for a determined amount of time at the discretion of the youth officer. For more serious offenses, or for a juvenile that has had multiple criminal contacts with the police, an officer may choose to petition the subject. A petition is a juvenile criminal complaint.

The Juvenile division is involved in many extra curricular activities within the Village of Brookfield and the Brookfield School System. Each year a Bicycle Rodeo is held for area youths. Various officers help in the event which encourages proper bike riding and safety. The rodeo is the largest event held each year by the police department. The rodeo also helps youths meet officers and begin to have a good relationship with them which may have a longer lasting effect on their future. The rodeo provides



children with bicycle helmets and even gives multiple children new bicycles. Programs such as "LETS WIN", which takes place at S.E. Gross Middle School, encourage officer/juvenile relationships through officers helping students with their school work or participating in sporting activities. Other activities such as station tours, school safety talks, school reading initiatives, and outreach activities help the juvenile division grasp a better relationship with the community and youths in particular. As juvenile officers make more positive contacts within the community juveniles are more likely to avoid making bad criminal decisions.

Police Crises Intervention Program

During 2016, the Brookfield Police Department responded to a total of 770 emergency calls for service that were referred for follow up intervention. Of those incidents, 542 (70%) were submitted to our in-house Police Crises Worker. Brookfield Police has established a longtime partnership with Presence Behavioral Health ProCare Centers. They are a community mental health center that offers outpatient mental health and substance abuse

services to individuals in the western suburbs. ProCare's Police Crisis program has been working with more than a dozen Police Departments of Proviso Township for well over 25 years. The PBH Crisis Team consists of a 24-hour Crisis Line that provides crisis counseling to callers, as well as a means of reaching Police Crisis Workers who provide community based services to the residents of Brookfield and Proviso Township.




This highly qualified team is able to assess individuals who may be in need of immediate psychiatric hospitalization by completing an involuntary petition (legal order) when needed to ensure treatment for at-risk residents/victims, who may be a potential harm to themselves or others.

These victims are taken to a facility and assessed further by the appropriate medical personnel. In addition, all Police Crises Workers have access to a clinical licensed professional for higher level consultation during assessments when necessary. The Police Crises Workers provide a variety of direct services to residents, as well as training to Police Departments on how to interact with individuals with mental illness or other social service needs.

4 AM Liquor License Ban Yields Positive Results

In October 2014, the Brookfield Village Board voted unanimously to eliminate the 4 AM liquor license. The early morning tavern hours at three establishments had been a dangerous and problematic issue for police to handle for years. Since the beginning of 2010, officers had responded to 165 emergency calls at those three bars since the beginning of 2010, with 105 of those calls coming between the hours of 2 and 4 AM. the vast majority of "criminal" incidents also take place after 2 AM. on weekend nights. Prior to 2 a.m., Brookfield police reported just 14 criminal incidents at the three 4 AM. license businesses. Beginning Jan. 1, 2015 all taverns in Brookfield began to operate under the same license, which allows the business to stay open until 1:30 AM. on weekdays and 2:30 AM. on Friday and Saturday nights. This change produced a positive impact and reduced criminal activity.

Since this new regulation went into effect, public disturbance calls between the hours of 2AM and 6 AM have dramatically declined. In 2015 public disturbance related calls **dropped 73%** from 2014 and in 2016 the call numbers dropped again, **59% less** than in 2014, the last year of the 4 AM license.

TASK FORCE ACTIVITY

The Brookfield Police Department is a member of the **Major Case Assistance Team (MCAT)** which is composed of 28 investigators from 13 neighboring police agencies. MCAT is a law enforcement partnership, sharing investigative resources and providing different levels of support in a coordinated manner all in the best interest of solving high profile crimes and providing the very best public safety for member communities. In 2016, this collaborative effort helped to quickly solve Brookfield's first murder since 2010. With assistance from the entire MCAT Team, Cook County Department of Homeland Security, and FIAT SWAT, Brookfield Police Detectives along with key MCAT investigators and two agents from the Chicago FBI Homicide Initiative Task Force, were able to successfully bring charges against three individuals responsible for the January 2016 Murder of Brookfield resident Michael Smith.

In 2016 the Brookfield Police Department participated in sixteen (16) MCAT callouts, a 100% increase from 2015.


Brookfield Police Department is a member of the **West Suburban Enhanced Drug/Gang Enforcement (WEDGE)** Task Force. The primary goal of the task force is to make it difficult for gang members and drug dealers to sell, use or transport illegal drugs and commit gang related crimes within WEDGE communities and greater Cook County.

The Brookfield Police Department is a member of the **Felony Investigative Assistance Team (FIAT)** and has one certified SWAT operator that responded to three (3) callouts in 2016.


